- Linda Gegenfurtner, speech/language pathologist, Union Pleasant Elementary



District automates student absence calls

Hamburg Central is now using SchoolMessenger (district's automated notification system) to call/text/email parents regarding student absences. SchoolMessenger will contact parents/guardians when a student is absent and the Attendance Office/Health Office has not been notified of the reason for that absence. Parents/guardians will need to send in a note when their child returns to school. This measure is part of

the district's progression toward enhanced communication with parents/guardians.

SchoolMessenger operates from contact information supplied to the schools by parents/guardians. Parents/guardians who have not provided the district with a cell phone number and/or email address but who would like to receive messages through these means should call their child's school to update their information.
