# School Board focused on district priorities

The last week in October was School Board Member Appreciation Week in New York State. I'd like to use this space to highlight just a few of the important ways that our Board's leadership benefits the schools and our community. The Board of Education in Hamburg is 100% focused on the learning and growth of the students and adults in our school district. Their commitment to both community service and to leadership is absolutely vital to achieving the vision and mission of the school district.

This Board is truly present and engaged. Their visits to our schools, requests for presentations at Board meetings and regular attendance at school-based events serve as evidence of their deep commitment to learning. In recent years, their own School Board goals have emphasized the execution of our strategic plan, the efficacy of professional learning for our teachers and our progress towards assuring modern learning for our students. The results of their efforts can be measured in a variety of ways. Our graduation rate and our Regents Exam scores are among the highest in Western New York.

Because our Board gives us the tools to make good on our commitment to help every student thrive after High School in whatever path they choose to pursue, our young people are ready to succeed. According to a recent study by the Empire Center, Hamburg graduates are more likely to graduate with their degree from college after four years than those of all but a handful of other public high schools in Western New York. Importantly, our students whose learning after High School is a two-year degree or a job-specific certificate program are thriving in the workforce, serving our country with distinction in the military, assuming leadership roles in the community, and, in some cases, already running their own businesses.

The Board's oversight and engagement in our recently completed 2016 capital project has also been extremely valuable. By being able to tap into their insight, and combining that with the needs of the end users of the spaces that were renovated, this capital project resulted in the complete transformation of our High School Library Media Center, our Middle School Library Media Center, and our Middle School Family and Consumer Science Suite. As we progress in our planning for the 2020 Capital Project, the Board's input will continue to be a central feature.

The Board's stable presence as a key partner in leadership forms a governance team that allows us to look beyond our school district for important resources. Since 2015, we have secured over \$1 million in additional one-time state aid that has resulted in the renovation of the Library Media Centers at Boston Valley and Charlotte Avenue Elementary Schools, as well as the construction of maker spaces at the Middle School and at Boston Valley. Because our Board acts as a stable and thoughtful partner in the life and work of our school district, our state representatives have been able to extend this very important additional help to the Hamburg Schools.

Finally, the members of the Board are active in the community in ways that directly impact our schools. They serve on the Parent Child Connection, our District Safety Committee, our Strategic Planning Committee, on the Hamburg Industrial Development Agency and our PTSA. Many of them have been honored by the Erie County Association of School Boards for their commitment to professional learning and for their Board service.

An engaged, committed and thoughtful Board is absolutely essential to the success of any school district. In Hamburg, we have exactly that. If you see Board President Tom Flynn, Vice President Cam Hall, Laura Heeter, Robbin List, Michael Mc-Garry, Richard Schneider or David Yoviene out and about over the next few weeks, please tell them "thank you" for their service to our students and to our community.



## Elementary playground upgrades swing toward completion

Three down, one to go. In September, new playground pieces were added at Charlotte Avenue and Union Pleasant Elementary Schools, followed by an October installation at Armor Elementary. Community volunteers assisted on the Saturday installations, guided by Parkitects, a playground design and build company.

The district has been working toward transforming its elementary school playgrounds into areas where children of all physical abilities can enjoy activities together. At Charlotte Avenue, a new PreK play unit was installed. Union Pleasant gained two new play pieces: a climber unit and multi-seat seesaw. Armor also gained a new inclusive play piece: a wheelchair-accessible glider. Boston Valley Elementary will be revamping its outdoor play space in the near future.

In addition to district funding, grants from Sen. Chris Jacobs, the Hamburg Alumni Foundation, KOMPAN, Hamburg Music Festival and M&T Bank are helping to propel the projects.



Volunteers are students within the school district in Grades 8-12, who attend a workshop that presents valuable information about the impor-



NEVER FORGET — In October, sixth graders on Hamburg Middle School Team 3 heard a Holocaust survivor's firsthand account of life in concentration camps, based on his imprisonment during the last year of World War II. An electrician by trade living in Rotterdam in the Netherlands, Cor Feenstra was arrested as a 21-year-old and held as a Dutch political prisoner until liberation in 1945. The great-grandfather of Hamburg student Miles Liebenow, he spoke about inhumane conditions and loss of life as the norm in the camps. His daughter Nancy Feenstra assisted with the narration.

## Enrollment opens Jan. 15 for full and half-day PreKindergarten

Enrollment for the district's PreKindergarten (PreK) 2020-21 program at Charlotte Avenue Elementary School will open on Jan. 15 with registrations being accepted through April 8. There are both full-day and half-day PreK class options. Placement in the full day classroom is by lottery, which will take place on May 1. Registrations will be accepted after this date for the half-day session only, based on availability.

The program is available to children who will be four years old on or before Dec. 1, 2020. There is no cost to families who reside in the Hamburg Central School District and no income eligibility restrictions. The full-day classroom is a UPK classroom that is run in collaboration with the YMCA, and falls under the same New York State standards and guidelines as the half-day UPK classrooms.

The full-day class offers before and after-school extended hours

on-site at the participant's expense. The program provides meals and transportation to students Monday-Friday (one way transportation for full-day).

PreK provides children with opportunities for experimentation, exploration, discovery, challenge and interaction. It helps them become independent, self-confident, enthusiastic learners through spontaneous activity, play, carefully prepared materials and guided experiences.
