First graders from two schools connect as "grid pals"

First graders in two classrooms miles apart may not have ever met in-person but they're collaborating, learning from each other and becoming friends. It's the result of their two teachers teaming up and using technology in a modern version of




block coding to prepare for

the St. Patrick's extravaganza.

"pen pals." Instead of writing back and forth, the 23 students in Mindy Wolf's class at Union Pleasant Elementary and 20 in Dara McFadden's class at Boston Valley are sharing their thoughts, problem solving and having fun with each other via short videos.

They call themselves "grid pals" as they use the Flipgrid social learning platform to virtually connect. Since the beginning of the school year, they've used technology to record introductory videos for each other, talking about their favorite part of first grade; create and solve math word problems; and discuss their activities during the February recess. At some point, they'll do a Writer's Workshop activity to share with their buddy.

They'll finally meet face-to-face on March 16 during a St. Patrick's Day-themed STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) learning experience in the Axis technology room at Union Pleasant. As partners, they'll construct mazes, code decorated Sphero robotic balls to navigate the paths toward "pots of gold" and get to know each other better over lunch.

"The social interaction piece is huge and so is the collaboration piece, especially because they're doing it across buildings," Mrs. McFadden said of this project. She added that the prospect of creating *(Please turn to page five)*

Boston Valley fifth grader leads peers in kindness

Kids are taking kindness to heart at Boston Valley Elementary School. As a way to keep a culture of kindness spreading in the school, fifth grader Sydney Sega recently approached Principal Nicole Lauer with a detailed plan of things students could do to promote the concept. A monthly project will continue to promote the kindness theme to the end of the school year. And, in order to keep it going strong, this year's fourth graders are being coached so they can carry on the work when they become fifth graders next year.

However, while each of them, individually, has great impact on our students, none of them operates independently of the others. We are very proud of our robust and thoughtful long-term strategic planning process that helps us align our initiatives

with one another and then assures that all of them together support the Hamburg Central School District's vision, mission and core values.

Our District Strategic Plan is revised each year in collaboration with our Strategic Planning Committee. This team comprises nearly 60 stakeholders from every school and job description, and includes parents and business leaders. We meet twice each year for a full day and our meetings are facilitated by myself and our senior leadership team. The plan, itself, has three Strategic Priorities — one that emphasizes the quality of our educational opportunities for students and staff, one that is focused on effective communication with internal and external audiences. and one that addresses finance, facilities and safety.

Our "look fors" represent a continuum of transportable skills and dispositions that, when we see our students exhibit them, we know that they possess the skills that will help them thrive in a mid-century world that is increasingly influenced by volatility, uncertainty, complexity and ambiguity.

Each of our Strategic Priorities is accompanied by the Commitments that we make as a district to assure that we actually prioritize each Strategic Priority, and the Commitments are each supported by a series of Action Steps. In Strategic Priority #1 -Educational Opportunities, we have a set of "look fors" which serve as evidence that our Action Steps are effective in forming the learning experiences that the research and our experience tell us will lead to deep and modern learning for each student.

It has been the development of our "look fors" which are the things that our students will say, see, feel and do when we are keeping the six Commit-

ments —that has been the focus of our most recent efforts. In short, by knowing what we are looking for in every classroom, they help us answer the question, "How will we know when we are actually walking our talk?"





Kindergarten & PreK registering for 2020-21

Enrollment is underway for Hamburg Central's Kindergarten and PreKindergarten (PreK) programs for the 2020-21 school year.

The district offers full-day kindergarten for children who are legal residents on the opening day of school and who are or will be five years old on or before Dec. 1, 2020.

The PreK program, housed at Charlotte Avenue Elementary School, is for children who will be four years old on or before Dec. 1, 2020. There is no cost to families who reside in the school district and no income eligibility restrictions. There are both full-day and half-day PreK class options. 

and sharing work with a wider audience has been a great motivator for the students.

Mrs. Wolf agreed, "They're taking ownership of their learning. They're sharing and getting feedback from their peers and making adjustments. The modern learning skills that they're acquiring are transferrable across content areas."

The teachers say that technology has opened up different types of learning opportunities for students as they work through missteps and frustrations together to reach a goal.

"Failure is a learning opportunity," Mrs. Wolf said. "Sometimes it's messy and chaotic but when they finally find success, they're so excited and happy about it."

Integrating technology into the instruction has also allowed the teachers to see a different side of some students and their communication abilities.

"They can be so quiet in class but when they have an iPad in their hands and they're recording themselves, they're a whole different person," Mrs. Wolf said.


